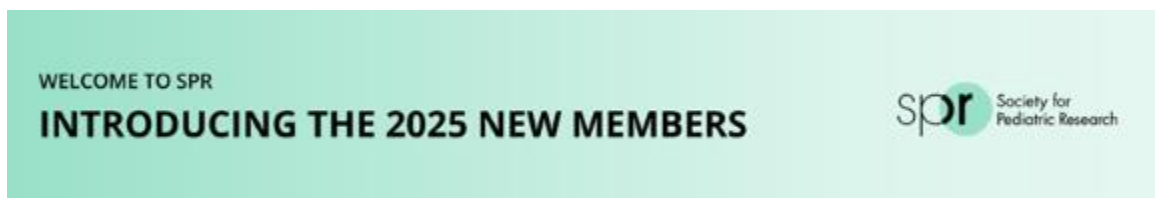

Dr. Muñoz Pareja also was featured as a new Society for Pediatric Research (SPR) member:



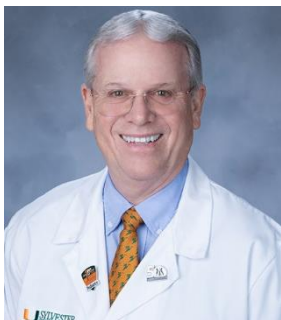

WELCOME, NEW FACULTY AND STAFF!



Alejandra MacQuhae, MD, joined us as Assistant Professor in the Divisions of Pediatric Cardiology and Pediatric Critical Care Medicine. She was born and raised in Caracas, Venezuela, where she completed her MD at the Universidad Central de Venezuela. During medical school, she was actively involved in national student leadership, while also pursuing research projects addressing health disparities and social drivers of health, including community-based research and initiatives with indigenous populations in Venezuela.

After moving to the US, Dr. MacQuhae completed her pediatric residency at the University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Hospital, where she also served as Chief Resident, and completed her fellowship in pediatric critical care medicine. She has been recognized for her excellence in teaching medical students and residents, as well as with the CARE Spotlight Award at Jackson Memorial Hospital in two consecutive years, an acknowledgment of her commitment to the institution's mission and values.

Most notably, Dr. MacQuhae is a recipient of the RAPID Scholars Award from the Academic Pediatric Association. Her research focuses on post-intensive care syndrome in pediatrics, with particular attention to inequities related to social drivers of health, and their impact on long-term outcomes in critically ill children. She has also led research on neurodevelopmental outcomes in children with congenital heart disease undergoing cardiopulmonary bypass.

Dr. MacQuhae is committed to advancing equity in pediatric critical care and improving post-ICU outcomes. She is currently working to establish a dedicated post-ICU follow-up clinic to better address the long-term needs of children and families after critical illness.

Outside of medicine, she enjoys exploring new restaurants, going to the beach, traveling, and spending time with her husband, energetic young daughter, and extended family.



Alex Zusman, MD, joined us as Assistant Professor in the Division of Neonatology. He grew up in Broward County in a Cuban/Peruvian home, and returns to Florida after three years in New Zealand, where he served as Chief Medical Officer for The Clinician, a digital-health software company developing products that measure health outcomes for a variety of industry uses and quality-improvement programs.

Dr. Zusman earned his BS in Biology at Duke University and MPH in Epidemiology at the Yale University of School of Public Health. He obtained his MD from the University of Florida College of Medicine, and completed his pediatric residency at UCSF, where he concentrated on advocacy and leadership for underserved populations. Samira Abudinen Vasquez, MD, joined us as Assistant Professor in the Division of Neonatology. She is a board-certified pediatrician specializing in neonatal-perinatal medicine and pediatric palliative care. Johanna Ferreira, MD, joined us as Assistant Professor in the Division of Pediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology, and Nutrition. She brings particular expertise in pediatric hepatology, including chronic liver disease, cholestatic disorders, acute and chronic hepatitis, and diagnostic and therapeutic interventions, including upper endoscopy, colonoscopy, and liver biopsy. 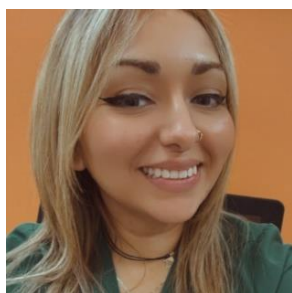

Ronald McDonald House Charities



Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) South Florida celebrated a historic milestone on September 9, 2025, breaking ground on a \$33 million house that will broaden access to family-centered care in the region.

The “Hope has a New Home” groundbreaking ceremony brought together RMHC Board Members (including **Dr. Glenn Flores** (in second photo above in front row, four person from the right)), community leaders, healthcare partners, and dedicated supporters to rally around a shared commitment to keeping families together.

Located just steps from Holtz Children’s Hospital at Jackson Memorial Medical Campus, the new seven-story, 60,000-square-foot Ronald McDonald House will almost double present accommodations. The current House, built in 1982 with 31 rooms, is always full. Last year, 128 families were turned away due to space limitations, with an average wait time of 14 days for a room. For families navigating complex diagnoses like pediatric cancer and organ transplants, a two-week wait for a room can be an unimaginable burden. This expansion will enable RMHC South Florida to serve more than 420 families annually, providing 5,740 nights of comfort and eliminating the waitlist for free pediatric lodging.

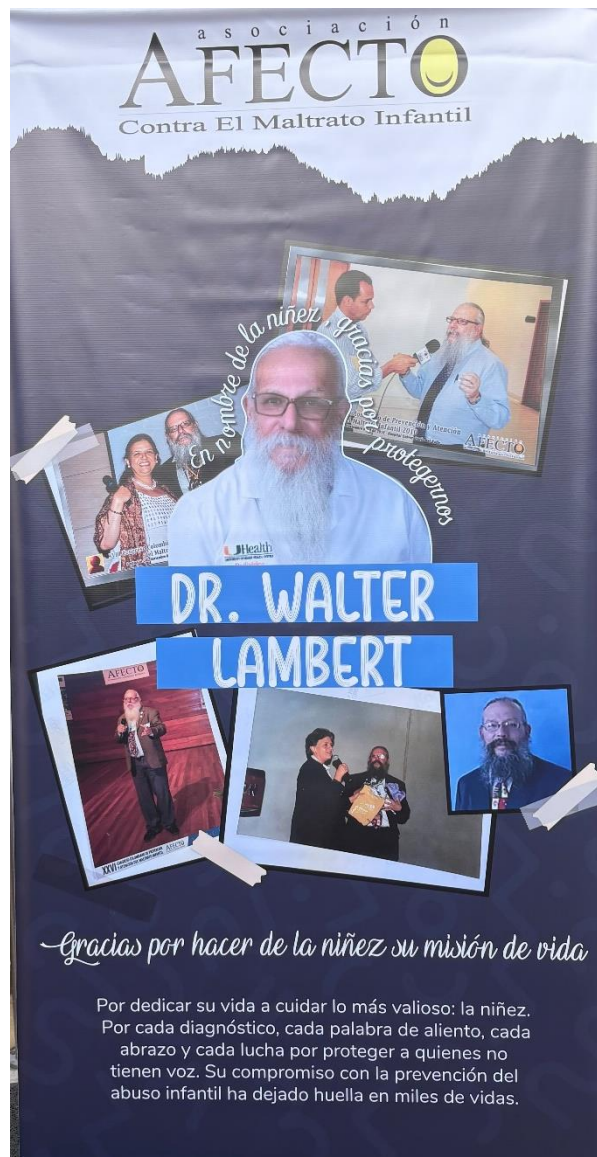
